

Transcript Christmas Potluck Program, December 15, 2018

This is an edited version of the transcription projected on the screen during the program portion of our annual Christmas Potluck. The transcriber used the "TypeWell" method synthesizing the essence of the discussion using advanced abbreviated software. Thus, the following is not necessarily verbatim.

Mike Sweeney, Chapter President: That was a wonderful meal. Thanks everybody for bringing the food.

We have a couple of gifts to offer, a thank you card and two types of gifts. You can take one or the other.

Larry Wonnacott, Chapter Vice President: A dehumidifier. Most cochlear people have a dry box. But this is just for your hearing aids. Pam can tell you more about it. It is good to store your hearing aids in it.

Pam Spencer, Programs Chair: Some of you might have seen these before. This is a dry desiccant. You take it out of the bag and put it in the container. When you take your hearing aids off you put them in the door. That keeps them fresher for

a longer period. When you wear a hearing aid inside your ear you get a lot of condensation. It can break the receivers down. Eventually the receivers will go green or blue. When that happens, take them out and put them in the microwave for a minute or two until it goes back to yellow. (DO NOT put the hearing aid in the microwave!)

The directions are in here. You want to hang on to those. They also include an audio wipe, a moist wipe. This is a sample. You can wipe your hearing aid clean. It is a disinfectant wipe for your hearing aid.

If you have questions about this don't hesitate to ask me.

The irony of the whole thing, he came with his dad. I was to play with the orchestra, a 20 piece mostly wind orchestra. It was the song "That's All."

I warned him, I told him that the orchestra performs in a room with superb acoustics. I thought it might be hard on his hearing. We know about that. But there we were, both of us, this music blasts! You can't imagine the acoustics of a 20-piece wind instrument band! I brought ear plugs for Soren because I thought it wasn't healthy! We met at a hearing loss association meeting and we know certain decibel levels are dangerous! We were in the middle of that situation! It

was humongous noise! But we both chose not to do anything. I have to hear what the orchestra is doing to sing, and he took his chances.

That was such an irony. We know about hearing loss and the causes but never the less the show went on. I got to know Soren better that way. We are very lucky to have him with our group.

Mike: We have two cards for Joan Baker. Joan, you have served as our president and on the Executive Committee.

Joan: Thank you. It has been a pleasure to be a part of this group. I have been a member since 2009. I have seen how much it has grown and how much we care about each other.

Tonya: We need volunteers for several things through next year. We need a backup webmaster. There are several other positions. We are looking for people to volunteer and help us out.

Joyce: We take everyone's help and appreciate it. It is wonderful that people see a need and help. Please contact me or Mike or Larry if you want to do something! We will put you to work!

Mike: Next meeting on January 19th we will vote on the officers and ratify appointees to the Executive Committee. We will do that in January. If anyone would like to volunteer to be on the Executive Committee, please let us know.

Now we are ready to sing! Bev is our director!

Bev: I won't sing any solo songs, but we are ready to sing. One custom I am sorry to see fading away is singing, especially around the holidays. People used to go door to door and serenade people. You go to someone's party and house and someone plays guitar or accordion, people joining in with song? That doesn't often happen anymore. I am happy to keep this alive here.

Here are your song sheets. I am going to lead, and you pick the songs on the sheet you would like to hear and we will go for it. Tell me by number. You might want to pick "Silent Night" and that is number 5. You decide! We will sing what

you like!

Speaker: How about number 1?

Bev: OK, "deck the halls"! Joan Baker at the grand piano will give us the starting

key.

[Deck the Hills]

That was excellent! Let's keep going!

Speaker: Number 8.

Bev: OK, "We Wish You A Merry Christmas"!

[We Wish You a Merry Christmas]

Bev: Alright! Number 9. "White Christmas." It is hard to bring the grand piano in

here.

[White Christmas]

Speaker: Number 2.

Bev: OK, we have a request! Rudolph!

Elizabeth: We must act it out too Bev!

[Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer]

Speaker: Number 5.

Bev: We have a request for number 5. OK, a nice quiet song. If you know the harmonies join in.

[Silent Night]

Bev: That was very nice! That really sets the mood for the season. Thank you. Larry: Thanks Bev.

Claydene Lederer: Melanie Cool's (presenter scheduled for January 19th) youngest son, Luke is going to Rome the day after Christmas to march in the New Year's day parade. There will be over 100,000 spectators. The parade ends at the Vatican where all will be blessed by the Pope. Luke is representing Bellingham High School where he is the Drum Major and jazz band member.
